

release *Lonely People With Power*, the screams are back along with some seriously headbanging riffs.



However, one of the drawbacks of the scream vocals is they could be reciting the back of a cereal packet and you wouldn't know the difference, at least not without resorting to reading the CD insert with a magnifying glass.


Nevertheless, it is a really great album. Standout tracks for me:

The final track, The Marvelous Orange Tree is very good too, but the video (mostly a still) is a bit icky so I'm not linking it.





So how did I get "into" Stereolab? It was for a long time a favourite of David Oya, the former editor of WIMM?

As a result of his praise, I listened to *Peng!* and thought it was rubbish. I also saw the band play on TV in the early 90s and they were dreadful. Out of tune vocals, sloppy playing and pretentious posing.

However, some years later I happened to listen to *Cobra and Phases Group Play Voltage in the Milky Night* - a 1999 release not loved by the critics. I thought it was great for perhaps the same reason the critics didn't - it veered away for loungey art-pop to atmospheric prog rock, including the 11-minute masterpiece *Blue Milk*, with its incredibly long "tension hold", reminiscent of *Starless* by King Crimson.


Despite boasting a new producer and some new members (after the 15-year hiatus) the new record sounds unmistakably Stereolab with reassuringly silly song titles such as *Esemplastic Creeping Eruption* (live rendition https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=v-ekAZt_D2g with long Hawkwindy outro).

VIDEO REVIEWS

Outlander Season 7 (Blu-ray) (2025)

Quite a wait to get a "proper" copy of this on Blu-ray. There were some dodgy DVDs around previously which were poor quality and / or not region 2 and / or just the first half of the series (which was broadcast in two chunks with a large time gap between them). I had pretty much given up on getting it when I saw it for sale in Asda!





Season 7 is the last-but-one, though there is a new Prequel called *Blood of my Blood* about Claire's parents in the 1910s, filmed in Scotland (Doune Castle visited by Crets!).

Season 7 was set in the USA and Scotland (different times) though it was all filmed in Scotland. The full series is 16 episodes, with the first part being mainly the Frasers and the Civil War in the USA and the second mostly the Mackenzies in Scotland, in the 1980s with some trips back in time, dealing with a plot to steal the gold hidden by Jamie in the first part, and the (related) abduction of their son.

Both stories are much more gripping and engaging than those in series 5 and 6, which I enjoyed but now seem a little tame in comparison. Talking of tame, with Jamie and Claire both getting on a bit (late 50s?) there's very few steamy scenes with them, though Jamie's bastard son (a captain in the British Army) gets involved with a prostitute who turns out to have links with the Mackenzie family.

Romance also for "young" Ian (the Mohawk) and a spot of bother when he unwittingly kills an old lady (who was stealing the aforementioned gold). Her husband then refused Ian's offer of his life for her life. Meanwhile, Claire does briefly marry (the gay) Lord John to save her from execution for working with the rebels as a field doctor and more egregiously passing secrets. This was after Jamie was lost at sea, assumed dead. This not being Game of Thrones, the viewer assumes he isn't really dead, and boy, is he mad when he returns to the USA!

Season 8 is scheduled for release in February 2026, but probably won't be available on disc until 2027.

BY MODERATELY POPULAR DEMAND - ROUND 3 OF 5



Rules: In this variant the highest scoring answer(s) AND the lowest scoring answer(s) all score no points, so you want to be somewhere in the middle with your choice. To complicate matters each player has four tokens to play on each round. The tokens can be distributed however the player sees fit, even all four on the same category.

- Double Token double the score of one (named) answer (in one category)
- Half Token halve the score of one (named) answer (in one category), rounding up
- Destroy Token eliminate one (named) answer (in one category)
- Shield Token prevent the elimination of one (named) answer (in one category)

Conflicting Double and Half tokens cancel, so two Doubles and a Half on the same answer equates to one Double. However, a single Shield token protects an answer from elimination by any number of Destroys. See TCD7 for examples.

I am still thinking about some rule changes, but will be completing the current 5-round game as is, then get comments / suggestions about improvements.

John maintains his lead with a healthy 6 points, with his closest Rival Roger top scoring with 8 and Brad zooming up the scoreboard with 7.

The programming language and job both yielded *nul points* with a lot to choose from. Note I decided Software Developer and Programmer are same job, but Data Administrator / Database Administrator are not (the former is more business-oriented and the latter more technical). No love for Windows for the OS and old-timer Facebook was a surprise scoring answer for the social media app.

FRAGMENTS: BOOTIFUL BOOKS - GAME END COMMENTS

Howard Bishop: Really enjoyed the game. I got a little lucky in that I was reasonably familiar with most of the books you included. Getting the year of publication for Gormenghast was key too. The word structure clue is very powerful. Possibly a bit more useful than year of publication. Not sure how useful asking for specific letters is because everyone benefits. Would definitely play this again.

GM Response: In one of the variants you get a number of special points (SPs) and the word breakdown costs 2, the others 1. Specific letters might indeed help other readers but if you ask for a less common letter to be revealed on a clue, and nothing appears, then (only) you have learned that that letter is not in the clue (or the GM has missed it!). Revealing a letter by position may be more helpful to you than others because you have spotted something they haven't, albeit the revelation of that letter might mean that others *do* now spot that thing.

Bob Gingell: Although I guessed one book early, I struggled to decipher the clues. I am in awe of Howard's run of all 8s and 9s! I deciphered Gary Gygax but did not regard a set of games rules as a book which is why I went for a novel linked to D&D instead of the Players' Handbook. Good thinking for those who did get it right.

Andy Lischett: Despite finishing second to last I enjoyed Bootiful Books. Mark me down as liking War and Peace. After I realized that every woman seems to be a princess and every character has three names, it is a great book. Long, but I didn't want it to end. One of my 9 or 10 favorites.

Bob Pitman: A bit of a disappointing points haul for me! Congrats to Howard on a stonking win. There must be a method I am not seeing, perhaps I shall try some statistical letter groupings next time. Fun game, lots of staring in hope at letter strings, some success... but maybe I need to guess earlier!

John Walker: A great little game, let's hope I don't ruin the next one.

WHERE IN THE WORLD IS KENDO NAGASAKI - ROUND 7




This time it's the Three Wishes variant, with one of the wishes changed from last time - see https://variablepig.org/rules/kendo.html.

You can ask the *Kendo Genie* to help you three times in the game. Each wish can only be used once, and only one wish can be granted per round. Anyone using a wish is emailed the result promptly so it can be used for the current orders (so you need to do it *before* the deadline!)

You can ask the genie for the "bonus clue" for the round, who was the closest person in the previous round, or how close you were last time (e.g. 3rd nearest). When a wish is used, the turn report will mention that player x used a wish, but not which one.

Any number can play, just send in a guess for the name and location of Kendo. As before, both the person and the place must have a Wikipedia entry. The person can be alive or dead but must not be fictitious or non-human.

Five people agree on Kendo's identity and two on the hiding place. Either or both could be wrong.

The round can be placed before or after any of the rounds, so this time it could be before R22 or after R22. You cannot use another special card on this round but you can engineer a finish. You can also choose not to play the card at all during the game.

Bob Gingell: In Round 1 I started first and grabbed the routes between Cosham and Waterlooville which included two single links, but that meant that I missed out on the direct Denmead to Waterlooville route. I can't say that was what won it for me, but it helped to have that good direct line between the Northern and Southern towns that was also close to the Eastern towns. The map has only two central N-S connections with the major roads running along three of the map edges, which lengthens routes using those Most scores were close so the map is fairly balanced unless a player gets locked out of the Denmead - Waterlooville axis. The towns in the south west are all diamonds which makes a link to them essential, and the Eastern side of the map is more profitable than the Western which is why players strong in the East did better than those strong in the West. Thanks to all for a hard fought game and to Richard for designing the map and running it.

Michael Pargman: Congratulations to Bob for winning. He has an interesting network going through all the small towns in the East. I didn't have any hopes of running for victory after being cut off from the East and South-East. Instead I just built to try to get some extra points from payments. Game End Statements:

Brendan Whyte 1st, WHCW blue: I was worried in the early rounds that Richard's near-monopoly in the NW would run away with the game, and I was annoyed to miss out on connecting anything east of Farlington, so I'm somewhat surprised at the win, but it was a fun game. Thanks Richard for the map and Bob for the management.

<u>Richard Smith 2nd, B2150 green</u>: Looking at the R12 races, I think Brendan is the most likely winner but it will be close. As designer of the map I have to admit that despite being nice-looking and having an interesting mix of major and (very) minor routes, it suffers from *too many draws* syndrome. Multiple ways of connecting the same towns is good for avoiding players getting cut off, but if the total number of stops is roughly the same, draws are inevitable. Perhaps it would work better with RR-style *most past the post* race results?

Roger Trethewey 3rd, ROGER orange: Congratulations to Brendan for a good win. It is a good map, and enjoyable to play. The last two rounds proved good for the blues. Thanks go to Bob as gm.

Steve Ham 4th, CARTOON purple: Congratulations to Brendan for the win. The temptation to head to the non-places Hundred Acres and North Boarhunt in the first round didn't pay off. Richard's network looks similar but the motorway investment didn't appear to pay off at all, to either of us. This might need to be looked at. Thanks for running the game.

<u>Bob (GM)</u>: Brendan's WHCW had a better set of races in the final Round which allowed him to pull away from Richard's B2150. At the end of Round 9 ROGER was in the lead, but Roger could not maintain that in the last three Rounds. The map worked well although Steve's gamble on remoter locations to the West failed to work out and he was blocked from the important connections Eastwards from Denmead.

Notes on the map: The direct route between Waterlooville and Cosham was owned by both the winning companies in the two games in this zine and does seem to be particularly useful, with minor roads across the centre being more important than the major roads around the edges of the map. My policy as GM of rolling 4 races within each card suit saw players owning routes between the closely linked southern diamonds benefitting from this. However, there were many ties, and it did not seem to be a game-breaker overall since all players were able to build routes there.

A poor round for MARS which only enters 4 of the possible 5 races, leaving Race 20 as a solo entry for BAD. BAD is now a clear leader while AZERI moves into second place. MARS takes the long route through Armenia while BAD cannot yet reach over the Turkish border and AZERI joins MARS in Russia. No entries in Race 13 means BAD should be able to enter that race in Round 10.

GM correction to Round 8 report: BAD ordered a build into Iran at C56 but I had mistakenly already drawn this build because of an earlier order that was later amended. As a result I wrongly disallowed the build and allowed a continuation of the build to E26. The correction, notified to all players so that orders could be adjusted for this Round, is that BAD (green) should have the build (C55) - C56 added but (F26) - E26 is deleted. The in-game map was updated.

I have made a tweak to the rules such that only 2 squares are revealed at the start, and APs reduced by 2 as per later rounds.


The dungeon has been created, almost entirely randomly with the exception of 3 extra tiles to make it all fit together with the extra starts.

For the early rounds only, the dungeon fragments that can be seen are shown next to the character card. Heroes do not know the monster they will face until they land on the square and the GM (who also doesn't know) draws a monster card. This means conditional orders are required for combat. It takes 2APs to reach the monster square, the remaining 1 (Barbarian & Fighter) can be used to escape back to the known tile, or with 2APs (Elf) going forward to the unknown tile is an option.


