

On Saturday I'm travelling to Colombia with my brother and family and meeting up with my sister and family. Yes, it will be a long flight - and I'll start going in the wrong direction since the first stop will be Helsinki. Then Madrid and Bogota. We'll arrive 21 hours after starting, but it doesn't end there. We will stay at the airport for another 7 hours and then continue to Cartagena. I hope I'll be able to sleep on the plane.

I hear Colombia is currently considered reasonably OK for tourists provided they stick to the known safe areas. Terrorism and crime being rife in many other places. I guess Venezuela's not too popular at the moment.

I hope your retirement plan works out as you want it. When you go, will you need to turn over work and knowledge to someone? When I retired, I gave notice 6 months in advance. My idea was that they would get me a replacement so that we would have maybe two months to transfer knowledge and work procedures in an orderly way - and that I would have time to use all my vacation days. That did not turn out as I had hoped. When two months remained I was told that they had gotten permission to start advertising for a replacement. That meant that besides my normal job I also had to document everything I was responsible for and try to sketch out my plans for ongoing projects etc. I didn't have any vacation as I had hoped for and instead got paid for 30 unused vacation days. And it took about 6 months after that for me to wind down from that last stretch of very stressful months. In the end I think it took 3-4 months after I left before they had a replacement in place (and in the meantime used consultants to fill the gap). Really good economics in that...

Whilst I don't currently have a replacement allocated, I am expecting to train him or her up in the new year. It is complicated somewhat by a change of "tech stack" for the newer systems I support, whilst the old systems still have a while to go before they shut down. The old address matcher uses Elasticsearch and BM25 which is old hat but effective. Its replacement uses a product called Splink, after we briefly flirted with NLP using LLMs build with SBERT. We found that semantic relevance is not usually valid for comparing addresses. For example Kings Road and Queens Road.

Really sorry to hear about Riley, he does look like a proud beast in your pictures. Our Missy passed away from kidney disease Feb 2024. She had been diagnosed 6 or 7 years before and had been on a human kidney medicine sematra, gabypentine for a bit of arthritis and a blood pressure pill for all that time. When her kidneys gave up it was painfully obvious, we came down several times during the night and she was still with us and early appointment with the vet gave us no hope. Like you I held her as she passed and blubbed. She was a rescue but she had an extra life with us. Still missed as I am sure Riley is. Oddly enough one of the ladies in the running group used to be a chemist and still has patents from when she had a role in developing gabypentine.

That does make me wonder if Riley's problem might have become apparent sooner, but he'd had routine checks at the vets and showed no signs of ill-health. In fact he was always incredibly fit and strong, and never got fat despite his enthusiastic eating habits (which I always assumed were the cause of his occasional honking, usually on the carpet, though once is was on my chest as I lay in bed).

FILBUM REVIEWS

Anna von Hausswolff - Iconoclasts (CD) (2025)

I decided not to include the front cover picture in this review as I think it's a bit naff. A shame because the music is exceptionally good! The inside cover and CD have some minimalist artwork. I'm not sure what the significance of the stick is (?)



Iconoclasts is Anna's 6th studio album:

Singing from the Grave (2010)

Ceremony (2013)

The Miraculous (2015)

Dead Magic (2018)

All Thoughts Fly (2020)

Iconoclasts (2025)

It ends a long wait for fans who loved *Dead Magic* and *The Miraculous* and wanted more gothic art-pop (*All Thoughts Fly* being organ recitals).

The album is very long as are some of the tracks (*Iconoclasts* is 11 minutes and several others clock in around 7 or 8) which gives some credence to those who say Anna is prog. That label actually doesn't appear on her Wikipedia entry, and it is well-known that she has been accused of worse things than being a prog artist. Some of her concerts have been picketed by protesters claiming that she is "satanic", which is rubbish. Yes, she has contributed to tracks by US metal acts *Wolves In The Throne Room* and *Sunn O*))) and one of her songs contains the word "devil", as is also true of Cliff Richard.

As is common these days, two tracks were released as singles in advance, *Stardust* and *The Whole Woman*, the latter being a duet with Iggy Pop. Both of these are excellent arty pop songs, though most of the rest of the album is a lot less "pop" with lengthy saxophone and organ sections.

Of the longer pieces, the title track *The Iconoclast* is great and I do suspect that the (briefly) flat singing in it is a finger in the air to Autotune. However, for me, the jewel in the crown is the stunning *Struggle With The Beast*, with its powerful jazz-metal groove.

EBB - The Mirror (CD and A5 booklet) (2025)

Right, let's get this bit over with. You can buy *The Mirror* from Bandcamp as a CD or a download, see https://ebbband.bandcamp.com/album/the-mirror. The CD comes in a lovely A5 booklet with some great photos and artwork. I set the booklet aside intending to take some photos for the zine but since then have been unable to locate it. Either it will turn up later, or perhaps I have binned it by mistake. So no pictures for the zine, you'll have to support the band and buy a copy if you want to enjoy the art.



Quite a few of the tracks on this album have been played live earlier in the year - *Reason* and *No-one's Child* being on the recent *Live at the 1985* DVD and on YouTube. Despite being great songs brilliantly performed, the number of hits for these vids is disappointingly low.

You see a similar thing on Spotify, with the band only getting a few hundred plays per week. That of course earns them absolutely zippedydoodah so they do rely on selling merch to earn money. Bandcamp lets you pay a bit extra for things as a sort of "tip" if you want to support the band, which I have done.

EBB stands for "Erin Bennett Band" and the talented Erin writes all the songs (with some input from other band members) and performs lead vocals and guitar. The band's twin keyboard sound works well with Nikki playing elaborate piano parts and Suna simple synths. Nikki also plays the flute and sax and the rhythm section of Anna and Bad Dog (the only male band member) are consistently good.

Evenfall is a beautiful intro number leading to the aforementioned live favourites Reason and Noone's Child.

The title track is almost great in my view, just drags a little, and this does in part back up the feeling that the band still has some room for improvement. Hopefully this can happen without loss of the band's charm.

The funky *That's How It Goes* is a lively number with a great bassline and sparkling keyboards, whilst *Cuckoo* is atmospheric and relaxing.

Take To The Stars is good but perhaps a little too conventional, melodic prog for this band. The wonderfully eccentric, Gong-like Day 19 (which includes lyrics about menstruation) certainly makes up for that. Finally, Geneva is a pleasing acoustic guitar-powered closer.

BY MODERATELY POPULAR DEMAND - GES

John Walker: It had some good ideas, but in practice I found it was not very playable, but hey I'll take the W.

Bob Pitman: For me I prefer a more vanilla version. This version is very playable and I quite liked it but it's a tad over-complicated. I'd play it again but I think it may be down to whether you want to GM it!

Mike Pollard: I didn't like the By Moderately BPD game, I'm afraid. Too chaotic and impossible to predict or use any strategy. Might have been better with more players, as any version of BPD needs 20+ IMO, but I think it would still have been pretty dire.

GM: There is too much going on at once to make it strategically satisfying. With lower numbers of players the danger of "wash-out" categories is significant. I am not currently planning a second attempt at this game, but what might work is...

- Everyone gets two double tokens and one destroy token to play each round, and they can be spread across the categories as the player sees fit (including all on the same one). There are no halves or shields.
- For each category, only the answer(s) getting the most destroys are eliminated.
- Any answer that gets 10 or more is considered "too popular" and scores zero. This will usually, but not always be as a result of double tokens.
- Any answer that only gets 1 point is considered "insufficiently popular" and scores zero.

BY WORDLEY DEMAND - ROUND 1 OF 5



New players are welcome and will start on the lowest score of the existing players (now 11).

Words must be valid according to this https://scrabble.collinsdictionary.com/check/ and not plurals.

The R1 theme was **movies directed by famous directors**. The letter used for Wordling is the first letter of the first word, even if it is "the" or "a". If a movie starts with a number that number is spelt out so 5 would be an F.

- 1) A movie directed by Alfred Hitchcock (Psycho, Vertigo and The Birds all scored 2)
- 2) A movie directed by Stephen Spielberg (ET and Raiders of the Lost Ark scored 2)
- 3) A movie directed by Stanley Kubrick (A Clockwork Orange scored 4)
- 4) A movie directed by Woody Allen (Everything You Ever Wanted To Know About Sex scored 3)
- 5) A movie directed by Martin Scorsese (Raging Bull scored 3)

Random five-letter words have been allocated to each entrant. These words are not plurals and are made up of 5 different letters. I decided to exclude any words containing an X.

All 10 entrants submitted legitimate words this time and obtained a Wordle score, which should enable some "milking" of letters going forward. Wordling scores 20 but a new word is then allocated. Serial BPD winner Mike is the early leader, with Bob G and Roger just behind. Early days of course.

Notes on Scoring

Each answer is given two scores in the format [*BPD*, *Wordle*]. A Wordle score of 4 indicates the letter is in the player's answer and in the correct position. A score of 2 indicates the letter is in the answer in a different position. Note that all the answer words do not have repeat letters, but a player's submitted word may have repeat letters, in which case both will score if the repeated letter is in the answer word (2 and 2 or 4 and 2).

Categories for Round 2

The theme for round 2 is **space**.

- For TV shows it's the first word of the title, even if it's "a" or "the" which means, for example, The Expanse gets you a T.
- For the astronomer and the astronaut, it's the surname, so Neil Armstrong gets you an A.
- The TV shows do not have to take place *entirely* in space.

End Game Statements:

- Michael Pargman (BAD, 1st): I don't like writing game-end statements before the game ends, but in this game I can't really see anyone catching up with me. Rounds 9, 10 and 11 were amazing for me, and I think the key to this was me getting a monopoly in the South West. This meant that I could leave a race out that no-one else could enter and pick my races better. Also I had some luck with the build to Iran, just at the right moment.

Thank you all for the game and a big thank you to Bob for GM-ing.

- Jim Reader (AZERI, 2nd): Congratulations to Michael for a totally convincing win and thanks to Bob for the game. I wonder if this game might have been closer with four players.
- John Marsden (MARS, 3rd): Congratulations to Michael, who got the link across Armenia first. Could be close for second.
- Bob Gingell (GM): Not close for second place after all despite some close scores at the end of Round 11. Michael's southern build into Nakhchivan was a key part of his success, while he left the North East alone which may also have been good tactics. Michael's BAD had the lead at the end of Rounds 6 and 9, so the writing was on the wall early on. MARS had a slow route from East to West, but it does look as if Jalilabad was the weakest of the start cities. AZERI had a strong network but many links did not pick up town bonuses.

I have suggested a few changes to the map that would make Nakhchivan more attractive and more accessible, but otherwise the map seems to work well.

Reaching Nakhchivan costs a lot and doesn't reap many advantages (unless no other rival contests your presence).

GM: In the game in Western Front, the winner was the only company to connect to Nakhchivan, so I think Brad is right, the cost is worth it for a whole pie, but not for a slice. Some excellent suggestions for improvements from Bob G last issue.

BAG OF DUNGEON - ROUND 3



Our intrepid dungeoneers are Jim Reader, Chris Hibbert, and Bob Gingell.

Note that if a monster survives battle against one or more adventurers, it recharges hit points.

Also remember that in the postal game the discovery is done at the start of the round, so later in the round characters should position themselves where they want to discover and may express preferences for equidistant tiles.

Report for Round 3:

Turn order: Sirrus, Torvok, Alendra.

Sirrus spends 3 APs to engage monster M2, the one in front of Alendra. Brave or perhaps foolhardy as with no APs left he cannot tag Alendra and cannot run away from the monster, which is (GM rummages in bag) a Troll - HP 10 attack 2D6+4. Sirrus has a morning star so he also is 2D6+4

The slugfest ends with the troll dead and Sirrus badly wounded. It might have been better for Sirrus if he'd rolled a double or two, but it could have been worse. Sirrus collects and dons some steel armour.

Alendra spends 1 APs to advance to the monster M2 tile. The monster is already dead and Sirrus hands her an Elven bow. She needs to decide what to do with the shield and the bow. Note that any item can go in the backpack so although it is not possible to have both in hand, one could be stashed in the backpack, or donated to another character on the same square.

Torvok spends 1 AP to advance one square to investigate the item square, and states a preference for discovering to the right. The item is a Magic Sword (+2 to combat roll and once per postal turn it can be used to reveal the identity of a monster in an adjacent tile).

Round 4 Actions:

Turn order: Torvok, Alendra, Sirrus.

Discovery: All characters automatically discover the two nearest unknown tiles (-2AP) - note that preference can be specified for use where there is a tie, otherwise random. The discovered tiles are shown on the current map.

Inventory: Characters may rearrange items (no AP) cost, and characters can also swap items and this requires conditional orders from both, unless they are on the same square at the start of the turn.

Move, Collect Items, Use Items, Combat: Characters can use some or all of their remaining APs moving to known tiles. Collecting items does not cost an AP, but using items usually does (cost on tile). Combat is always the last action but remaining APs can be used to deploy items and / or escape.





Each stamina point used deducts 1 second from the standard time.

Each turn you can play any amount of your remaining stamina or can opt for one of the following strategies:

Track - If you are level or within 5 seconds of an opponent, you can select this option. You will run at the same pace, but only use half the stamina points used by the runner you are tracking.

Relax - Run at the same pace as your previous 1000 metres, but only use half the stamina points previously used.

Target - You may target any runner that is within 15 seconds ahead of you. You use the same stamina as them, but catch them up.

If any option fails (i.e. insufficient stamina points), it will not be used and you would then run a 5-minute 1k. You cannot play the same strategy twice in a row.

If you are overtaken at any point 1 stamina point is deducted from your total.

If you are in the lead, you gain 5 stamina, second 3 stamina, third 1 stamina.

If you are last you lose 5 stamina, second last 3 stamina, third last 1 stamina.
